


Safety Officers and Safety Management Assistants

As per OPNAVINST 5100.19 (Series) Navy Safety and Occupational Health Program Manual For Forces Afloat, Section A2-12: If operations do not permit the prospective safety officer or safety management assistant to attend formal training prior to assuming the position, he or she must attend formal training at the first opportunity, and in the interim, complete the Naval Safety Supervisor Course (NAVEDTRA 14167F) located on Navy eLearning: https://lms.nel.navy.mil

What We Do

- Afloat Operational Safety Assessments (AOSA) (ships and submarines)
 - * Current AOSA is conducted every six years. Assessments are typically 2-3 days and are non-intrusive. Areas assessed are Evolutions, Programs, Watchstanding, Interviews and Fatigue Management.



- Provide tailored assists as requested by Immediate Superiors in Command (ISICs) and Afloat Units.
- Provide Safety Investigation Board Advisors (Class "A" Mishaps)
- Track Mishap Investigations, Endorsements and Data Trends
- Semi-Annual Mishap Analysis
- Conduct Waterfront Seminars and Fleet Safety Training
- Maintain Afloat Safety Program Manuals and Instructions
- Liaison with Systems Commands (SYSCOMs), Fleets, Type Commands (TYCOMs) and others.
