## Costume Safety

Avoid costumes that cause safety hazards.

All costumes, wigs and accessories should be fire resistant. Attach reflective tape to costumes and bags, or carry glow sticks to ensure other people and most importantly, vehicles, can see you in the dark.

Choose non-toxic Halloween make-up over masks to make sure your vision isn't obscured. If wearing a mask, make sure you can see clearly at all times.



## Pedestrian Safety at Night

A responsible adult should accompany young children on the neighborhood rounds.

If your older children are going alone, plan and review a route acceptable to you.

Agree on a specific time children should return home.

Teach your children never to enter a stranger's home or car. Instruct children to travel only in familiar, well-lit areas and stick with their friends.

Tell your children not to eat any treats until they return home, and take care to avoid any food allergies.

Children and adults are reminded to put electronic devices down, keep heads up and walk, don't run, across the street.
